Communion

I hope everyone has a communion cup. I'm going to go back to older practice and I'm going to ask you to take the bread when I pray at first, and then I'll make a few more comments before we take the juice. Today, Don is going to speak to us about patience. And it got me thinking about God's patience in bringing his children home. If you think about it, God was patient. After Adam and Eve had to leave the garden and humanity grew and they got more wicked all the time. And God was finally forced to start again. And He chose Noah. And it it tells us that God was patient in the days of Noah. It took a hundred years for that art to be built, for God to plan how he was going to restart things. And then after that, of course, people got wicked again. The Tower of Babel was their attempt to reach God on their own terms, not God's terms. And so God was patient until he found a man by the name of Abraham who was willing to leave his country and his people to follow God to a country he didn't know. And then when his people that he was trying to build needed correction and needed redirection, God raised up Moses to take them from the land of Egypt. But again, they rebelled. Again, they wouldn't follow God and he was forced to wait patiently for 40 years while an entire generation passed away until they could be in the land that they promised.

And then, years and years, God waited while they demanded a King, not God's plan, but he worked with them until finally he felt it was time for his son to come and be with us. And then he waited during that time, while his son spent his days trying to show God to the people for an entire lifetime. His son grew up, we think about three years he spent preaching to people, teaching them, demonstrating that he was God's representative. And how did they repay him? They accused him falsely of all kinds of things, including blaspheming against his own father and put him on a cross. And that, I think, might have been the time when God's patience was tried to the most from the time of that garden to the time when Jesus finally said, it's finished and gave himself up. God had lost his son. He was completely taken from him so that we might have life anew. We break bread this morning to remember that Jesus gave Himself on that cross, that He separated himself from God for the first and only time in all of eternity, specifically so that we could be washed clean. Let's go to him now as we as we pray for this bread that reminds us that he walked this earth in human form.

Father, we thank you so much that you were so patient that you waited for just the right time to send your son, that he came and walked among us, that he felt the same things that we feel hunger, temptation, father, frustration, all those things that that we find in our lives. He saw, as he wanted so desperately, to bring your children home and, father, we thank you that he put himself aside. He gave himself to your will, that we might be brought back to you. We break this bread now in remembrance of the fact that he lived and he died for us. We pray in his name. Amen.

And if God is patient, then we need to be patient to James reminds us of the example of the farmer, because as important as the cross is, it wasn't God's endgame. It was where Christ won a victory so that we could be with God. And James reminds us that farmers have to wait patiently for the rain in order to have a crop. God is waiting patiently for his crops. It's our job as Christians to reach out to

everyone who doesn't know Jesus in a personal way. So James says, Be patient and strengthen your hearts for the Lord's return is near. Until that time, it's our job to make his name known to all the people who don't yet have a relationship with him. Because there's nothing that God wants more in all the universe than to have His children with him forever. Let's go to God in prayer once more.

Father, we thank you for this cup that reminds us that he shared his blood, that it washes us clean, that he presents us spotless and white. As your children freed from the sin that so easily entangles us. If the people of James' day were having trouble waiting on you, how much more are we two centuries to two millennia later having trouble? It's so easy for our lives to just go on as if it's just another day. And Jesus hasn't come yet. Help us to live in in expectation, Father. Help us to live with joy because he has triumphed. And Father help us to spread the message to other children that he has died. And he is ready to present them to his father. We thank you for the blood of his covenant in Christ's name and through the Spirit we pray. Amen.

Reading: 1 Timothy 1:12-17

So it's first Timothy chapter one verses 12 to 17, I thank Christ Jesus, our Lord, who has given me strength that He considered me faithful, appointing me to his service, even though I was once a blasphemer and a persecutor and a violent man, I was shown mercy because I acted in ignorance and unbelief. The grace of our Lord was poured out on me abundantly, along with the faith and love that are in Jesus Christ--Christ Jesus. Here is a trustworthy saying that deserves full acceptance. Christ Jesus came into the world to save sinners of whom I am the worst. But for that very reason I was shown mercy so that in me the worst of sinners, Christ Jesus might display His unlimited patience as an example for those who would believe on Him and receive eternal life. Now, to the King eternal, immortal, invisible, the only God be honor and glory, forever and ever, amen.

Sermon

Good morning, everyone. Thank you for being with us today. I'm reminded that sometimes our attendance is a little bit smaller than we like to, but I'm also remembering that there are people around the world who will be receiving this message. And today, with the Great Lakes homecoming, there are people who will be there celebrating and worshiping there as well. So we're always delighted to have you here. Please don't get discouraged sometimes if you feel like there aren't as many people that you'd like to have here. There are people around the world who are watching this. And so we just live in an amazing time that God gives us the privilege to share this message and that there are people who are receiving it.

One of the ways that we explain God, if God can be explained, is he is the fruit of the Spirit. God is love. God is joy. God is patient. God is kind. God is good. God is so faithful and God is gentle. And He has self-control. Of course, in living out these virtues helps us to be closer to God. We pray to Him, but we also understand the fruit of the Spirit that we really can be closer to him. I came across this article by Chuck Swindoll that I thought you might enjoy having just held a memorial service for a friend several years younger than I who had died with liver cancer. I'd been thinking about how to respond when struck by an arrow of affliction, not a little irritating dart, but an arrow plunged deeply. My friend chose not to curl up in a corner with the calendar and put X's on days. On the contrary, the news of his malignancy only spurred him on to drain every ounce out of every day. His physician had told him that he would probably pass pretty soon before Thanksgiving. And he said, Says who? Not only did he live

through Thanksgiving, at Christmas, he threw a party! The following Easter was delightful. A fun picnic on the 4th of July was a great time and he had a special celebration in the planning stage for his Thanksgiving. A close friend of his told me that the last time they talked he had made an appointment to get his teeth fixed. I love that kind of spunk, he says. It underscores one of my unspoken philosophies of life. Forget quantity, pursue quality, look beyond the pain if you can and you will find incredible perspective. When the thorn punctured the Apostle Paul's balloon. He refused to wallow in self-pity and whine away the balance of his days. He learned glory in weakness. He discover a contentment in the midst of distresses, persecutions and difficulties. Patience became a lifestyle

Back in the mid 1980s, Bill Marriott Jr had hit the big time. His hotels in service for the talk of industry. He had acquired new properties in New York, Washington and Atlanta. Financially, he was fixed many times over. Even had a fine family resort on a beautiful lake in New Hampshire. Then, while starting the engine of his boat one morning, Bill was literally blown out of the water, an accident that would scar him for the rest of his days. Did he give up? Did he surrender to the arrow that stung him so deeply? No. He accelerated. He determined to press on stronger than ever. So which Arrow has struck you recently? Pain. Unfair treatment. False accusations. Struggles at home. Somebody throwing rocks. Then he says this. Make a decision to do what you are going to do even better than you had planned. Life's arrows are difficult, but their setbacks that can sometimes, if we allow it, help us to regroup, renew and reload. It is so true. Patience is a virtue. But it's also true that patience isn't easy. Patience is the very nature of God. And I'm confident that God is patient with us. So we need to be patient with one another.

I appreciate that article. I just want to say a couple of words today about patience as we go through the fruit of the Spirit. We looked at love, joy and peace. And now today, patience. Marjorie Holmes said, perhaps the hardest lesson to learn in life is patience to wait. Unperturbed while the child. Some of us remember this while the child in the highchair does everything with his food except eat it quietly. To hear out the tales and complaints of a long winded neighbor or friend to give earnest attention to a son or daughter as he or she describes in minute detail the movie or an episode at school. Not to interrupt. Not to be exasperated. To curb the forces within us that would hurry. Always hurry. Always in a hurry. No. But to be patient, to breathe deeply. And remember that God is patient. And He pours out his love into our hearts. Our part is to receive it and to thank him for the wonderful gift of patience. And sometimes patience is just stop, breathe deeply and remember, God is with me in the midst of all of this struggle, whatever it is He promised, I will never leave you. I will never forsake you. I am always with you. You are my child. So sometimes we can look at amazing people in Scripture and some of the amazing things that they've done and the troubles that they've gone through were part of all that as God took care of them, God takes care of us.

So in the Book of Ephesians, the Apostle Paul reminded Christians to be patient to the very best of their ability. And when Paul writes letters, he's often in prison as he's writing his letters. And here's what he wrote. As a prisoner of the Lord, I urge you to live a life worthy of the calling that we have received. Be completely humble, gentle, and be patient, bearing with one another in love. Make every effort to keep the unity of the spirit through a bond of peace. There's only one body and one spirit. Just as you recall to one hope when you were called one lord, one faith, one baptism, one God and Father, who is above all, through all and in all. And Paul had this patience for some reason. I have this picture in my mind. Y'know, Paul was thrown into prison. So many times he going to prison, he'd go out back, back and forth all the time. And I just picture in my mind it may never have happened, but I picture

Paul as he's writing letters while he's in prison and the jailer comes and opens him up. So. Okay, Paul, you can go home. Just give me a couple more minutes. I have things to write and that. That would be. That would be Paul. It wouldn't matter where he was, his circumstances are difficult, I understand that. But at the same time he's saying I have to be patient in my writings. I have to be patient in what I'm going to say. He was a very patient person. And if God is living in us and how many of us believe that God does live in us, if God is living in us and He's giving us His patience because patience is part of God, God will never say to us, Hurry up and be patient. Just doesn't work. God is helping us every day to be a patient. Patience comes from hard knocks in life. Talk to a very patient person and they'll tell you how many knocks and setbacks they've gone through. And because of that, patience has become a lifestyle. We don't sweat the small stuff. We remember that God said, I am always with you.

So the Apostle Paul had hardships and they seemed to go hand in hand. So patience became just who he was part of his life. He expected things to be difficult. He expected hard knocks, but he also tried to live out with this patience and demonstrate patience to others. So listen to Paul's testimony. Here's what he said. We put no stumbling block in anyone's path so that our ministry will not be discredited. Rather, as servants of God, we commend ourselves in every way, in great endurance, in troubles, hardships and distresses. Listen to this. In beatings, imprisonments and riots in hard work, in sleepless nights and in hunger, in purity and understanding, patience and kindness in the Holy Spirit and in sincere love, in truthful speech and in the power of God with weapons of righteousness in the right hand and in the left hand through glory and dishonor. Bad report. Good report. Genuine. Yet regarded as an imposter. Known yet regarded as unknown. Dying. And yet we live on. Beaten and yet not killed. Sorrowful. Yet always rejoicing. Poor, yet making others rich. Having nothing and yet possessing everything. Do you ever feel that way? We can get so lopsided in negative thinking and difficult situations that we've had to go through that we sometimes forget all the positives we have in Christ Jesus. And the positives always outweigh the negatives because we remember death is not even the end, that God promises life in Him forever and forever. So finding patience is quite amazing.

Somewhat comically, I think. At least I thought it was Henry Beecher said to a group of preachers, and I promise I won't do this. There is no such thing as preaching patience into people unless the sermon is so long that they have to practice it while they listen. So I promise that's not going to happen today. So we just talk about this patience of God that if we could just think about, be personal now each one be personal. If you can just think. How many times has God displayed unlimited patience in my life? Why did I get so impatient when God is saying, I'm giving you part of myself? Patience. Not easy. Guaranteed not easy. But it's there. In the last book of the Bible, Revelation, here's what John wrote: I, John, your brother and companion in the suffering and the kingdom and patient endurance that are ours in Christ Jesus, He was on the Isle of Patmos because of the Word of God. In the testimony of Jesus, Christians in the first century were being annihilated because they followed the love and teaching of Jesus and not the Emperor. They firmly declared Jesus as Lord, even knowing that it might lead to their death. So John reminds Christians this calls for patient endurance and faithfulness on the part of Christians. We are so fortunate living in Canada that we are not thrown in prison because we say that Jesus is Lord. But there are places in the world where it's very dangerous to be a Christian. And so John reminds Christians, this calls for the patient, endurance and faithfulness on the part of Christians. And because of that, we remember He is the Lord of Lords and the King of Kings and he lives within us. And for some reason God loves us so much that He's willing to call us His chosen, faithful followers. And I know that can just kind of roll off our tongue.

But if you could just think about the fact that when God looks at you and myself, he's saying, That's mine, she's mine, he's mine. And they follow the best they can. And I'm going to pour out my love into them and I'm going to give them part of me to you. I'm going to give them love and joy and peace and patience and kindness and goodness and faithfulness and gentleness and self-control. Oh, they might get mixed up a few times and they might mess up a few times. But I have patience, and because I'm pouring myself into them, they'll learn patience and they'll demonstrate patience. Listen to the remarkable words that belong to each one of us. It's in Revelation. Here's what he says. Hallelujah, salvation and glory and power belong to our God for true, and just are his judgments. Then a voice came from the throne of God, saying, Praise our God, all you, his servants who love Him, both small and great. Then I heard what sounded like a great multitude, like the roar of rushing water and like loud peals of thunder, shouting these words, Hallelujah, for our God Almighty reigns let us rejoice, be glad and give glory to Him.

So in conclusion today, yes, we will all go through very difficult times and maybe some people today who are hearing this message said, I am going through difficult times and facing challenges. It's part of our story of everyone's story. It's reality. Today, in the first century, John reminded Christians then and now the promise the Christians overcame by the blood of the lamb, by the word of their testimony, and they did not love their lives so much, even to shrink from death. And this takes great patience and remembering that God is a patient God and that God lives in us and he loves us beyond explanation. This truth that God so loved the world, that He gave His one and only son, whoever believes in him would not perish but have life everlasting, not just in the future, but today and tomorrow and the future. May we do our best to demonstrate as we go through the fruit of the Spirit, love, joy, peace, and also patience. And thank you for being patient with me today.

Closing Prayer

Maybe you've heard this expression, Lord, give me patience now, right? So on the one hand, intellectually, I know patience is a good thing and I want God to help me with it. On the other hand, I'm impatient. Hurry up. Well, maybe that's our split personality, right? The divine and the reality of living on this earth. And so that's the challenge for all of us to put into practice. See, that's the word. You got to practice and usually when you practice something, you make a decision. I decide in this situation, I'm going to practice or be or at least try to be patient, even though I know my tendency might not to be too patient. But I'm going to try to practice the fruit of the spirit, in this case patience. And so that's the challenge with putting all of these fruits of the spirit into our daily life and actually living them. See, that's the challenge is deciding to be patient and kind and joyful and loving and self-control. And I have trouble with that because I am human and I don't get it always right, as I'm sure you do not either. But the reality is, we're all works in progress and the grace given to us by God, the gift of salvation constantly perfects us when we're imperfect. And so that's our challenge this week, is to go with God and to remember he's going with us and to put into practice the characteristics that he wants us to demonstrate to the world this week, patience being one of them.

Let's pray. Our father, we thank you for your love. We thank you for your son and his example as he lived on this earth. We thank you for his patience with mankind and your patience with mankind. Because here we are on this earth, floundering around and doing so many things are contrary to your will, and yet you demonstrate patience and forgiveness and kindness and goodness towards us. So I

pray, Father, that you will help us to emulate that as we interact with others. This week is our prayer Christ name. Amen. Have a good week.

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
