I've been asked to read a reading. James five versus 5 to 13. You've lived on Earth in luxury and self-indulgence. You've fattened yourselves in the day of slaughter. You've condemned and murdered the innocent one who was not oppressing you. Be patient, the brothers and sisters, until the Lord's coming to the farmer waits for the land to yield its valuable crops, patiently waiting for the autumn and spring

rains, you to be patient and stand firm because the Lord's coming is near. No grumble against one another, brothers and sisters or you will be judged. The judge is standing at the door. Brothers and sisters, as an example of patience in the face of suffering. Take the prophets who spoke in the name of Lord. As you know, we count as blessed those who have persevered. You've heard of Job's perseverance and have seen what the Lord finally brought about. The Lord is full of compassion and mercy. Above all, my brothers and sisters do not swear, not by heaven or by earth or by anything else. All you need to say is a simple yes or no. Otherwise you'll be condemned. Is anyone among you in trouble? Let them pray. Is anyone among you happy? Let them sing songs of praise.

Communion

To be honest, I probably shouldn't be up here presiding over a sacred meal as a very sacred meal. And I probably should be the last one I say to, because the last couple years have been hard on me and there have been times by the sort out a lot of anger, lamentation, all our prayers that I felt like they weren't answered a lot of questioning. And yet here I am presiding over the table. And yet I have you. Whether you choose to believe what I believe or not, you're wrong. You're still invited to a table. Students, you're invited to the table. Well, it's true that we were not. Because Jesus died for you. Are your sins just as much as you did for mine. And the message isn't so. A remember I'm being a Christian for crying. For 46 years I've seen my peaks, I see now I see embrace my valleys, my struggles. And this is the darkest period of my life. But yeah, bottom line is Jesus died for me and he still has a plan for me. I'm still trying to figure what that plan is in our lives.

We're going to face these periods. I'm sure I'm speaking to I'm preaching to the choir cause these to, especially those have been around a lot longer than I have, the kingdom serving faithfully. And I'm. So I thought, well, what can I say? Um, around a table. A table that, in four days from now. Good Friday. Hours before he went to die, Jesus performs, presided at the table with his 12 disciples and shared a Passover meal and instituted what we know as the Lord's Supper. But who is at the table? Well, 12 disciples. They had their doubts, I said, been in the thick and thin through their lives. And now these last three years with Jesus and they've been on their peaks, which is and now they were in the valley and Jesus has been telling them beforehand at least three times that we have recorded in the Scriptures that he's going to be betrayed to the chief priest and the elders and, you know, the law, and he's going to be crucified. And this isn't God's plan. But he's going to overcome. He's going to rise again after three days. And guess what? He rose again, according to the scriptures. Who was at that table? Well, we have obviously Judas. And what did Judas do? Judas was the one that actually betrayed Jesus for 30 silver pieces, coins.

And then we had Peter, who Jesus called his rock. That he would build his church, yet Peter denied Jesus three times during a trial before the rooster crowed. And then he he came back and was one of the pillars of the church. He sought Jesus' forgiveness and Jesus restored him. What about the other ones? Thomas. And you know we got and they're all filled with doubts. And some of them were confused and some of them might have been angry and full of despair. Kinda what I'm going through now. But Jesus had them at the table, and no matter what... you as a student, maybe facing or going through, or whether you believe or not, or whether you may be in the throes of Christian life and things are getting tough. Jesus would want you at the table and he wants to share this meal with you because he died for you. He wants you to remember that his the bread represents his broken body and the blood which takes away our sin, was for us and for not only for us, but for the entire sins of the people

of the world once and for all. So you may not think you're important or you may not think Jesus cares, but he died for you. And that's what this communion's all about.

And bottom line is, that's the understanding that I have to come to And I'm dealing with that no matter what my journey is, and where my faith is dragging me to. God is going to be there right with me. Jesus is going to be right there with me. So think about the communion especially now because we're going into, uh, The Passion Week, as we call it, and we're thinking about all activities that Jesus went through and He went through for us, but he instituted this feast to help us remember that the cross, which I'm sure wasn't a lot of fun for him, too, I'm sure he knew he had to go, but as a human being, he wasn't like enjoying that fact very much. But he still went because he loved you and me, you know. So let's think about these things and let's make this week of Easter, a week that's important to us because it was important to him.

And so let's go to God in prayer and remember these things that no matter what our troubles may be, God's going to be there and through the worst of times and the best times. Dear heavenly Father, thank you for the many blessings that you do give us, although many times we fail to see them or understand them as I'm going through this prayer myself, help me to realize. Help us to realize that this feast is important to us, not only this kind of Sunday, but it reminds us each and every day of our lives. Thank you, Lord us so much that you went to the cross and died for us and took away our sins so that we didn't have to die for our own sins. We love you and thank you for this and help us to be grateful, eternally grateful and serving you in our lives. In Christ's name, amen.

Reading

1 John 1:1-7

Good morning. [Good morning]. So the reading this morning is from first John: That which was from the beginning, which we have heard, which we have seen with our eyes, which we have looked at and our hands have touched. This we proclaim concerning the word of life, the life of appeared. We have seen it and testify to it. And we proclaim to you the eternal life which was with the father and has appeared to us. We proclaim to you what we have seen and heard so that you also may have fellowship with us. And our fellowship is with the father and with his son. Jesus Christ. We write this to make our joy complete. This is the message we have heard from him and declare to you God is light in Him. There is no darkness at all. If we claim to have fellowship up with him yet walk in the darkness. We lie and do not live by the truth. But if we walk in the light as he and then lie as he is in the light, we have fellowship with one another and the blood of Jesus, his son purifies us from all sin.

Sermon

Good morning, everyone. [good morning] Today I want to share with you the most important sermon that has ever been preached. And please understand that it has absolutely nothing to do with my preaching. But it has everything to do with what the apostle John said and what the Apostle Paul said and what the Hebrew writer wrote. And what Peter said, and most importantly, what Jesus said and did for all of us. This coming Friday is the greatest day of all days, the worst day of all days with Jesus dying on the cross. The greatest day of all days was Jesus dying on the cross. This shed blood forgives us from our sins. Our sins are not forgiven because Jesus was born. We celebrate his birth at Christmas and it's wonderful. Our sins are not forgiven because of his resurrection. We celebrate that at Easter very soon,

the resurrection. But because of Jesus shed blood on the cross, our sins are forgiven. Most people avoid Good Friday because in the past it was a detailed explanation of a crucifixion. And that is not what Good Friday is about. It isn't about how Jesus died, but what happened. Because He shed his blood. Jesus shed his blood for our forgiveness years ago. And it wasn't that many years ago. Typically, the churches of Christ in our area would gather over in Toronto for what was called a Good Friday, a time of worship. But in all the years of going to the Good Friday, the most significant event that's ever happened, nothing was ever said about it. It was completely ignored. So we had people coming from all over Ontario, upper Michigan and so forth, all gathering in Toronto for a Good Friday service. The Greatest Day and never was a word ever spoken about Good Friday, about the greatest day that ever happened. It was a sermon about this or a sermon about that. And I think we missed it.

We missed it. Christmas is wonderful, the birth of Jesus. But our sins aren't forgiven because of this birth. Our sins are forgiven because of his crucifixion. He shed his blood for our forgiveness. So that's why we have some of these amazing scriptures. Listen to these scriptures that many of you know so well. John 316 For God, so loved the world that He gave his one and his only son and whoever believes in him should not perish but have everlasting life. How through the blood that Jesus shed for us, his precious blood. That's notice today. Just a variety of scriptures, Christ blood for our forgiveness. It's emphasized everywhere. I know that many of you know the Scriptures, but when you put them all together as one, I think it's just overwhelmingly brilliant. Sad to the nth degree that Jesus had to do this for us, but he did it, and he'd be happy to do it for us if it hadn't happened already. He has shed blood. Matthew, 26. When the disciples were gathering together, then Jesus took the cup and he gave thanks and he offered it to His disciples saying, Drink from it all, all of you. This is my blood of the covenant, which is poured out for many. For what? The forgiveness of sins or in mark chapter 14, verse 24. Jesus said, This is my blood of the covenant, which is poured out for many, meaning all of those who will accept it. And then in the Book of Acts, the Apostle Paul is saying goodbye to the elders of this amazing church at Ephesus. Paul knows he's going to have a challenging time, as so, Paul reminds them with these words, Keep watch over yourselves and all of the congregation of which the Holy Spirit has made you overseers be shepherds of the Church of God, which He bought with His--help me--own blood.

Or Romans 3:25. So Paul says, God presented Jesus as a sacrifice of atonement, which means forgiveness through faith. How in his blood? I mean, if we learn through repetition, we've got to get this. We've just got to get this. This blood of Jesus brings us together as one in Christ. Jesus gave Himself for us, shed his blood for us. So when you take communion, when we take communion, that little sip is more than just grape juice. It's the understanding of who Christ is, what he's done for us, what he does for each one of us. So Paul says that God presented Jesus as a sacrifice of forgiveness through his blood. And as if we're kind of slow learners. Paul Repeated and repeated and repeated. Romans five. He emphasizes peace and joy for all in Christ because of Christ's sacrifice for us. By saying this, since we have now been set free, since we've now been justified, how much more shall we be saved from God's wrath? Because of Christ's shed blood? Or in first Corinthians 11 and verse 25, and often at communion, we we read these words, Paul is doing his best to help the church in Corinth, a church that was dealing with significant struggles with just about absolutely everything. And Paul reminds them of this. This cup is the new covenant of the blood of Christ. And so, as if Paul doesn't say it enough, he says it again. Ephesians one, seven and eight in Christ, we have forgiveness through his blood, the forgiveness of sins in accordance with the riches of God's grace that He lavished on us with all wisdom and understanding.

So if you just did a real quick reading of the New Testament, what's going to stand out in your mind? More than anything else, the Christ loves us that He's given himself for us, that he lives in us and that we come together. We remember one another by holding each other up, remembering the sacrifice of Jesus Christ, our forgiveness. How, by his blood, by now in Christ Jesus, you who were once far away, have been brought near by the blood of Christ. Or when Paul writes to the church at Colosse: For God was pleased to have all His fullness dwell in Jesus Christ, to reconcile to Himself all things. Listen to this now, whether things on Earth or things in heaven, by making peace! How? Through his shed blood on the cross. Then we don't know who wrote the book of Hebrews, somewhat of a historian going back and helping us to remember all of those people who gave themselves up, sacrificing themselves. But he says this When Christ came as the High Priest of the good things that are already here and we have a lot of good things already here, he went through the greater and more perfect tabernacle that is not manmade. That is to say, not part of this creation. He did not enter by the means of blood of goats or blood of calves. But he himself entered the most holy place once for all, by his own blood, having obtained eternal redemption, the blood of goats and bulls, the ashes of a heifer. Sprinkled on those who are ceremonially unclean. Sanctify them so that they are outwardly clean. How much more, then, will the blood of Christ, who, through the eternal spirit, offered himself unblemished to God, cleanse our consciences from acts that lead to death so that we may serve this living God?

I reflected this past week, looking on all the years of being in different churches that many of you have been to, various churches, so forth. The many sermon talks about communion, the many readings that we read about communion. But the focus is forgiveness of sins and what it cost for the forgiveness of sins. And so when Peter writes, he says this for, you know, that's important for you know, that it's not worth perishable things such as silver or gold, that you were forgiven from the empty way of life handed down to you from your forefathers. But with the help me precious blood of Christ, a lamb without blemish, a lamb without defect, the perfect sacrifice. And as we read today but if we walk in the light, as he is in the light, we have fellowship with one another and the blood of Jesus, his son purifies us from all sin. We have fellowship with one another. Have you ever stopped to think that this Jesus who lived, who taught, who died, who was raised, and who lives in us today, that when we gather today, we remember Jesus has shed blood for our forgiveness, the relationship that we have with him. We can say thank you for the greatest gift that has ever been given. So if we walk in the light as he is in the light, we have fellowship with each other, fellowship with one another, with God, the Father God, the Son of God, the Holy Spirit, all because of the atoning sacrifice which is said in first John 2:2 that Jesus is the blood sacrifice. He is the atoning sacrifice for our sins. But listen, but not only for our sins, but for the sins of the whole world.

So in the last book of the Bible, the revelation, this great victory celebration song toward the end of the Book of Revelation, talks about this from Jesus Christ, who is the faithful witness, the first born from the dead and the ruler of the kings of the earth. To him who loves us and has freed us from our sins by his blood. Listen now. It has made us made us to be a kingdom and priests to serve his God and father to him. The glory and power forever and ever. Amen, because of his shed blood. Jesus sees us as priests, the one who could hold the understanding of sharing the message of God, the Father God, the Son, God, the Holy Spirit, His shed blood for our forgiveness. If there was ever a message, that's a message. Then in heaven there's this picture, and I hope that you can see it with me in heaven. The people gathered and they sang a new song. Here are the words You are worthy to take the scroll and to open its seals. Because Jesus, you were slain and with your blood you purchased men and women for

God from every try and every language and every people in any nation talk about a gift of gifts. And then in Revelation, one of the elders asked me these in white robes. Who are they? Where do they come from? And I answered, Sir, you know. And he said, These are they who came out of great tribulation. They have washed their robes and made them white in the blood of the lamb. Yes. So in Revelation, it concludes with the battle of between Jesus and Satan. It's no contest. There's no contest. It's over. The shed blood of Jesus forgives our sins. Even when the accuse raised or wants to throw doubts in our minds. No, no. He did it for us. Listen. And they overcame Satan by the blood of the lamb and the word of their testimony. And they did not love their lives so much, even as to shrink from death. And I saw heaven standing open. And there before me was a white horse whose rider is called faithful and true with justice. He judges and makes war. His eyes are like blazing fire and on his head are many crowns. He has a name written on him that no one knows but himself. He is dressed in a robe, dipped in blood. And his name is the Word of God. Jesus Christ.

So in conclusion, it wasn't easy being a Christian in the first century. Such persecution, it was rampant. The Hebrew writer encourages us, even today, to be strong in Christ Jesus, just as our forefathers were strong, especially in times of trouble and persecution. I thought hard and long whether I should include this, but it is in the Scripture and I think it's important to hear, as difficult as it is to hear in a says this. And what more shall I say? I don't have time to talk about Gideon or Barak or Sampson or Jephthah or David or Samuel and the prophets who, through faith, conquered kingdoms, administered justice and gained what was promised, who shut the mouths of lions, quenched the fury of the flames, and escaped the edge of the sword, whose was turned to strength and who became powerful in battle and routed foreign armies. Women rec- Women receive back their dead, raised to life again, but others, not others were tortured and they refused to be released so that they might gain a better resurrection. Some faced jeers, some flogging. Still others were chained and put in prison. Some were stoned to death. Some were sawed in two. They were put to the death by the sword. They went about in the wilderness and sheepskins and goat skins. Destitute, persecuted, mistreated. The world was not worthy of them. They wandered in deserts and mountains and in caves. And they lived in holes in the ground. They were all commended for their faith. Yet none of them received what had been promised. Please hear this. Because God had planned something better for us. So that only together with us would they be made perfect.

And even though we aren't there just yet, many of our loved ones are. And so, God, us. He helps us to see a picture of where we are. Even if we aren't there yet. Here's what he says. But you have come to Mt. Zion. You have come to the heavenly Jerusalem. You have come to the city of the living God. You have come to thousands upon thousands of angels in joyful assembly to the church of the firstborn whose names are written in heaven. You have come to God, the judge of all the spirits of righteous people, made perfect to Jesus. The Mediator of the covenant, and to the sprinkled blood that speaks a better word, even than the blood of evil. Therefore, since we are receiving a kingdom, since we are receiving a kingdom, it can't be shaken. Let us all else be thankful. And so worship God acceptably with reverence and or may. Good Friday live in you each and every day of your life. Amen.
